ASSOCIATE DEGREE IN **ACCOUNTING**

The Associate Degree in Accounting program equips students with the knowledge and skills necessary to carry out tasks related to the accounting profession, as well as financial statement analysis and bookkeeping. In their study program, the student will learn the basic principles of accounting, the state and federal income tax rules, as well as the conceptual framework that governs the profession. The 64-credit curriculum includes business administration courses such as economics, finance, and management. Concentration courses include basic accounting courses as well as computerized accounting and Puerto Rico and federal contributions.
